Pensionomics 2025:

Measuring the Economic Impact of DB Pension Expenditures

Key Findings

Benefits paid by state and local pension plans support a significant amount of economic activity in the state of Maryland.

Pension benefits received by retirees are spent in the local community. This spending ripples through the economy, as one person's spending becomes another person's income, creating a multiplier effect.

In 2022, expenditures stemming from state and local pensions supported...

38,808 jobs that paid \$2.3 billion in wages and salaries

\$7.3 billion in total economic output

\$1.2 billion in federal, state, and local tax revenues

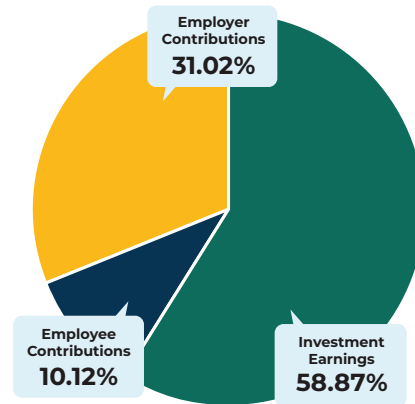
... in the state of Maryland.

Each dollar paid out in pension benefits supported \$1.19 in total economic activity in Maryland.

Each dollar "invested" by Maryland taxpayers in these pension plans supported \$3.83 in total economic activity in the state.

Overview

Expenditures made by retirees of state and local government provide a steady economic stimulus to Maryland communities and the state economy. In 2022, 224,107 residents of Maryland received a total of \$6.2 billion in pension benefits from state and local pension plans.



The average pension benefit received was \$2,294 per month or \$27,529 per year. These modest benefits provide retired teachers, public safety personnel, and others who served the public during their working careers income to meet basic needs in retirement.

Between 1993 and 2022, 31.02% of Maryland's pension fund receipts came from employer contributions, 10.12% from employee contributions, and 58.87% from investment earnings.* Earnings on investments and employee contributions—not taxpayer based contributions—have historically made up the bulk of pension fund receipts.

Impact on Jobs and Incomes

Retiree expenditures stemming from state and local pension plan benefits supported 38,808 jobs in the state. The total income to state residents supported by pension expenditures was \$2.3 billion.

To put these employment impacts in perspective, in 2022 Maryland's unemployment rate was 3.0%. The fact that DB pension expenditures supported 38,808 jobs is significant, as it represents 1.2 percentage points in Maryland's labor force.

Economic Impact

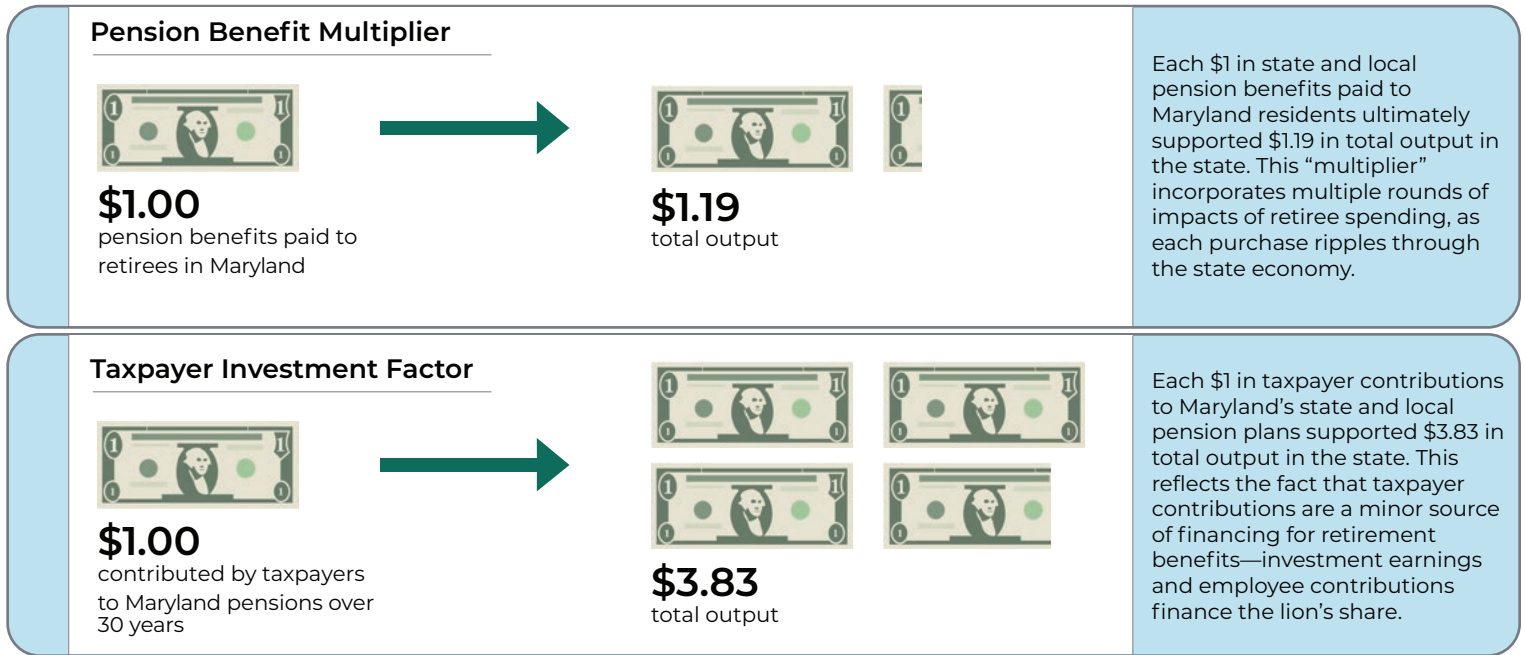
State and local pension funds in Maryland and other states paid a total of \$6.2 billion in benefits to Maryland residents in 2022. Retirees' expenditures from these benefits supported a total of \$7.3 billion in total economic output in the state, and \$4.5 billion in value added in the state.

Impact on Tax Revenues

State and local pension payments made to Maryland residents supported a total of \$1.2 billion in revenue to federal, state, and local governments. Taxes paid by retirees and beneficiaries directly out of pension payments totaled \$61.3 million. Taxes attributable to pension expenditures in the local economy accounted for \$1.1 billion in tax revenue.

Economic Impacts by Industry Sector

The economic impact of state and local pension benefits was broadly felt across various industry sectors in Maryland. The five industry sectors with the largest employment impacts are presented in the table to the side.

Industry	Employment Impact (# Jobs)
Hospitals	2,535
Limited-service restaurants	2,276
Offices of physicians	1,564
Full-service restaurants	1,547
Nursing and community care facilities	1,211

Industry totals include the first round of impacts from pension payments to state residents, and do not account for recaptured “leakage” to or from other states.

Economic Impacts by Occupation Category

The pension benefits in Maryland supported jobs in every civilian job category, as shown in the table below.
